

## Examples of Infrastructure Enhancements for ENGAGE Sustainability

- Collaborations across child-serving agencies (through MOU's etc.) (e.g. child welfare, juvenile justice, primary care, education, developmental disabilities, FCFC's) and among critical providers and programs to build bridges among partners, including relationships between community and residential treatment settings. Collaboration between child and adult serving agencies are critical when serving older youth who are transitioning to adulthood
- Assurances and demonstrations of how services are delivered within a family-driven, youth-guided framework and how families and youth are integrally involved in the governance and oversight of grant activities
- A newly implemented policy on cultural and linguistic competence and how it addresses issues of diversity and disparity
- Expansion of family and youth involvement, and demonstration that youth and families are integral partners in planning and implementation activities
- Coordination of SOC strategies with other fund sources (e.g. block grants, state grants, state allocations, local levies, foundation grants, etc.) and other state and local health care reform efforts
- Newly established strategic financing strategies that incorporates other child serving agencies and systems
- Newly implemented policies and practices related to trauma informed care in service delivery systems
- Development of social marketing and strategic communications activities to promote social inclusion, develop partnerships, and promote system of care values and principles
