

Catholic Charites has been seeking funding for the *Getting Ahead* program and services. Due to the challenges of funding the program and services have not started in Ashtabula. They are scheduled to begin in the fall of 2017.

FCFC collaborated with BH provider and presented training on Trauma Informed Care.
Trauma Informed Care training scheduled for October of 2017 for service providers, educators, and community.
Representatives of the Ashtabula FCFC Trauma Informed Care committee went to Stark County and met with the Stark County Trauma Informed Care Committee to gain information on what successes they have had in their community and to bring back ideas and information for Ashtabula County.

4. Identify any key findings (explanation of data findings; FCFC actions taken in response to key findings, etc.):

Ashtabula County has experienced a significant increase in opiate use, particularly heroin, which is both cheap and plentiful. The resurgence of methamphetamine abuse also continues to impact the number of children in protective custody.

The impact of this is continues to be evident as there continues to be an increase in the number of children in protective custody and higher placement rates than prior years.

Felony adjudication rates have improved substantially as a result of targeted programming implemented by Ashtabula County Juvenile Court and the commitment of numerous partner organizations to provide additional supports and services to meet the needs of youth and their families involved with the Court. Council agencies are working closely with the criminal justice system to address the issue in a collaborative way. Council continues to support and/or coordinate prevention and treatment strategies, provider education and other initiatives to address substance abuse and related issues (generational poverty, human trafficking) across sectors.
