

We have found that those participating in any of the TIC trainings have been very receptive to the information. We were very pleased that all Council member agencies sent at least one representative to participate in the Train the Trainers and also willingly signed an Agreement agreeing to provide in-house trainings to their staff through their trained staff member. Forms were developed and shared with each trainee/agency for consistency of reporting data and participation. The following forms were shared: Participation sign-in form; participant pre/post survey. These forms are then submitted to FCF upon completion for entry into our database.

We also implemented a TIC Agency Self-Assessment with all Council member agencies. The survey was developed in SurveyMonkey and sent to each agency head to be shared with all staff members to complete. Thus far, over 100 surveys have been completed. Once this process is complete, we will be sharing the results of each agency's assessment with their respective agency, so that they can begin developing a plan to infuse trauma informed practice into their agencies. The purpose of the survey is not to be judgmental, but to simply initiate conversations, awareness and knowledge of the impacts of trauma. The survey will provide us, and each agency, with a baseline to track impacts of agency trainings and knowledge of TIC. The survey will be repeated annually.

Through this process, knowledge of and commitment to Trauma Informed Care has been elevated with all Council agencies. We have also begun to forge a new collaboration with Marietta College around TIC and look forward to working with their Education Department as we move forward with our emphasis on TIC School Trainings. The efforts around TIC have also strengthened our relationships with local school districts in the county and we will continue with our plan to provide the Trauma Informed Care Schools training per request, through our in-house Trauma Informed Schools Trainer. Correspondence has gone out to all school districts regarding the opportunity to access this free training.

3. List the data source(s) for the indicator(s):

A Trauma Informed Care Train the Trainers was held April 5, 2017. The FCF in-house TIC Trainer, along with an additional TIC trainer housed at Children Services presented the full-day training. The training was open to Council member agencies including parent reps, although a few non-Council member entities requested to participate and were welcomed. Twenty-three people from thirteen different agencies/organizations and two school districts participated. Participant data was gathered from registration and sign-in forms, as well as surveys. Certificates were given to participants and all information is located in a database of Trainers at FCF. All Council member agencies were asked to sign an Agreement prior to the TIC Train the Trainers, stating that they would complete their respective agency in-house training by January 1, 2018 and continue the trainings with new employees as needed. All agencies signed the agreement.

A Trauma Informed Schools and Classroom 3-day presentation was sponsored by Marietta College on June 5-7, 2017 and attended by 54 people, with three Washington County School Districts participating with approximately 20 county participants. The trainer was a national trainer from Louisiana.

Ohio State University Extension Office completed their agency training by having their trainer (from the Train the Trainers) train their staff of 11 people on June 12, 2017. A participation form and pre/post surveys were submitted to FCF and included in our database of trainings.

In May 2017, Trauma Informed Care training was presented to 19 law enforcement officers at the annual Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training. The training was presented by the FCF in-house Trauma Informed Care Trainer.
